## **'Alice Creighton' Camellia japonica**

This beautiful bloom pictured below honors Alice Creighton, for whom the cultivar was named by her husband, Walter Creighton, longtime members and devoted leaders of the Camellia Club of Mobile. Originated in Semmes, Alabama and registered in 2008, *Alice Creighton* is a formal double camellia distinguished by its rose-pink petals edged in white. 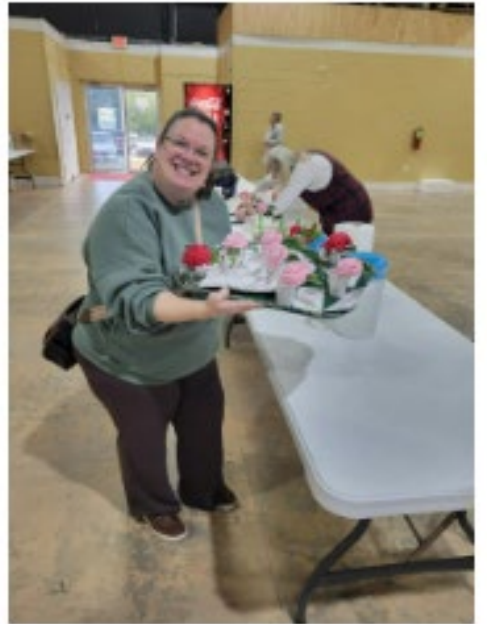

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## A Camellia Mystery from the Show Table

One of the great joys of our Annual Camellia Show is discovering something unexpected—and this year, we had just such a moment.

In reviewing information from the show, a camellia variety name caught my attention: ‘**Mon Louis Pink.**’ Further research confirmed that *Mon Louis Pink* is listed in the *Supplement for 1996 and Subsequent Editions of Camellia Nomenclature* (the American Camellia Society’s “red book”). What makes this cultivar particularly intriguing is that it appears to be rarely documented, with no readily available published images.

Although a photograph was not taken during the show, **Paul Huerkamp**, who entered the bloom, generously provided a photograph afterward, allowing us to include it here. Having a visual record of *Mon Louis Pink* adds valuable documentation to the historical record of this officially recognized cultivar and helps preserve knowledge of camellias that may be quietly grown but seldom photographed.



According to information shared by Mr. Huerkamp, *Mon Louis Pink* is sometimes compared to *Lady Vansittart Red*, though it is slightly richer in color with subtle differences in petal form. He also notes that the bloom's color deepens slightly in colder weather. The plant itself has a long history—grafted by his father in the early 1960s—making it more than 60 years old and a living example of camellias preserved through generations of careful cultivation.

The appearance of *Mon Louis Pink* in our show serves as a reminder that camellia history is still being written. Long after many cultivars have faded from catalogs and publications, they continue to live on in private gardens and, occasionally, reappear on our show tables.

Discoveries like this highlight the important role our members play—not only in growing beautiful blooms, but also in preserving camellia heritage for future generations.
